

Singer, Eleanor

Eleanor Singer is a research professor at the Survey Research Center of the Institute for Social Research at the University of Michigan. Her research focuses on motivation for survey participation and has touched on many of the important issues in survey methodology, such as confidentiality, informed consent, incentives, interviewer effects, and nonresponse bias. Two major studies examined the role of privacy and confidentiality concerns as factors in response to the 1990 and 2000 decennial censuses, and her earliest research examined the effect of informed consent procedures on survey response rates and quality. She was a member of the National Academies panel that produced *Private Lives and Public Policies: Confidentiality and Accessibility of Government Statistics* in 1993, and chaired the National Academies panel on *Expanding Access to Research Data: Reconciling Risks and Opportunities* (2005). She is most recently a coauthor of *Survey Methodology* (with Robert M. Groves and others), and a coeditor of *Methods for Testing and Evaluating Survey Questionnaires* (with Stanley Presser and others). She holds a B.A. from Queens College in English and a Ph.D. in sociology from Columbia University.
